









Curriculum overview

Where it is such a key life skill, we feel this sits at the very top of our home learning priorities.



Reading




- Record reading (including genre) (ideally daily)
- Reading records must be in school every day.
- Read with expression and pay attention to the punctuation used
- Ideas for questions and activities to use when reading with your child
- Teachers will acknowledge reading records every **Monday** but may also check these throughout the week
- Books will be changed on Friday.



Reading 'High 5'

- Bring your reading record in every day.
- An adult will check your record every Monday.
- Once you have read five times (this does not have to be in the same week and weekends can be included) an adult will tick the 'High 5' reading chart and you will be given a pom -pom for our class jar!
- When the jar is full of pom -poms, our class will get time to celebrate our success together with a reading raffle activity chosen by the children!

Fantastic Mr Fox by Roald Dahl

When Joe tells a local news reporter exactly what he would do if he were leader of the country, the video goes viral and Joe's speech becomes famous all over the world.



EXPLODING VOLCANOES

As a finale for our Volcano topic, we would like the children to make their own volcano and bring it into school **w/c Monday 31st March 2025**.

Year 6 will watch as each child attempts to explode/erupt their volcano.

Make Your Own Volcano

You will need:

- washing-up liquid
- baking soda
- vinegar
- red food colouring
- plastic cup



You could also build a paper mache volcano and put the cup inside it for extra effect!

- 1 Fill your glass just over half way full with water. Add 3 teaspoons of baking soda and give it a good stir until most of the baking soda dissolves.
- 2 Add a good squirt of washing-up liquid into the cup and once again give it a stir.
- 3 Make sure your volcano is in the kitchen or outside (or somewhere you don't mind making a mess).
- 4 Quickly pour in just a quarter of a cup of vinegar and enjoy your very own volcanic eruption!



How you can help...
